NEWSLETTER SUPPORT -- We are sorry to lose the wonderful support we have received for the past three years from Hermal Pharmaceutical Laboratories, which arranged for the printing of the FOCUS newsletter. The General Manager, Mr. James Tombros, has been a loyal supporter of NIF since its inception, and his dedication and his company's generous committment to education in dermatology is exemplary. The Foundation could never have afforded to publish such a high quality newsletter for you without the help of Mr. Tombros and his company.

This loss means you and I as NIF members must assume the responsibility and expenses for publishing the newsletter ourselves. The newsletter isn't free, you know. Everyone who receives a copy is expected to contribute to its publication costs. Publishing and mailing the newsletter six times in 1985 is projected to cost almost \$12,000. NATIONAL ACTIVITIES -- 1984 NIF activities focused on December. We held two regional conferences (Washington, D.C. and Tulsa, OK), attended the American Academy of Dermatology ("AAD") annual meetings, and consulted government leaders in Washington, D.C. about increasing ichthyosis research.

AAD MEETINGS -- The 1984 annual meetings of the AAD in Washington, D.C. were a great success, thanks to the support lay foundations like NIF get from the AAD meeting staff. In recent years, the Academy has been particularly responsive to the needs of the patient support groups who wish to participate in the national meeting. Charles Eichhorn and Mike O'Connor represented NIF in the Exhibit Hall, Medical Presentations, and meetings with AAD officers. Over 5,000 doctors attended the meetings, as well as almost 2,000 pharmaceutical company exhibitors. The doctors' interest in NIF was higher than ever before, and we were cleaned out of every piece of literature we brought!

1984 REGIONAL CONFERENCES -- Although registrations were down because the last newsletter was late, the Washington D.C. and Tulsa, Oklahoma Conferences were both real successes for all who attended. Valerie Luters, Contributing Editor, reports on the Washington conference in this Newsletter. Look for details on Oklahoma in the next edition. In addition to the doctors who provided the medical presentations, we want to thank Betty McMasters and her crew in the Tulsa Chapter for all their help in making the day such a success.

FUND-RAISING -- We have begun our fund-raising effort to support the newsletter and full-time Executive Director position, and have begun interviewing candidates. NEW ICHTHYOSIS TYPES -- Any skin disorder with a thickened keratin layer that is dry and scaling is collectively lumped under the title "ichthyosis". Did you know that dogs and mice have forms of ichthyosis? Some doctors from England have recently identified an unusual form in people in the West Indies. Although we usually think of ichthyosis in four major categories, there are actually many subclassifications, some extremely rare. The common thread is dry, scaling skin, but the causes and symptoms can vary dramatically.

CONFERENCE VIDEOTAPES -- The medical presentations for the 1983 National Conference in Chicago have been transcribed and are being reviewed by the Medical Advisory Board speakers for accuracy. It's tough to turn a speech into a written article. We hope to publish excerpts in coming issues of FOCUS. Presentations from the 1984 Regional Conference in Washington were video-taped. We hope to make these tapes available soon to all members on a rental basis for nominal fees.

TELL ME DOCTOR COLUMN -- Look for it in the next issue of FOCUS, but send in your questions right away!

NEW!! HOT TIPS COLUMN -- A new feature of the newsletter will be practical tips we get from all over: members, doctors, other publications, and common sense. Neither the National Ichthyosis Foundation nor its Medical Advisory Board recommends any "Tip." NIF acts only as a clearinghouse for information about ichthyosis. You should consult your own physician and follow their advice before acting on any Tip. A Tip that's good for one person may be fatal for another.

SCALES IN HAIR: How to get them out? It's the most common question we get. Dr. Gene Van Scott of our Medical Advisory Board recommends applying a scale softening lotion or cream to the scalp and covering it with a shower cap overnight. A morning shampoo, massage and brushing does the trick for most patients.

DEODORANTS: Body odor caused by perspiration is a problem for most people, even many with ichthyosis. Anti-perspirants may block what little perspiration there is. Consider a deodorant spray without an anti-perspirant in it. Check the label before you buy. More on odor problems next month. Got any suggestions?

SAUNA SUITS: Many dermatologists recommend their patients use a waterproof exercise suit to cover their topical treatment overnight for better occlusion. (I use one over my 50% water/50% propylene glycol solution.) Unfortunately, most of these suits are made of relatively stiff and cold vinyl plastic. Although inexpensive to start with, they don't last through very many washings. Worse, they are downright uncomfortable. Good News: The Sleep Sauna Co. at 404 Westview Road, Elkins Park, PA 19177 offers a soft and comfortable waterproof Sleep Sauna suit developed by dermatologists. Easy to wash, it's made from a soft woven nylon that should last for years instead of weeks. They cost under \$40 and are a real value in comfort and durability.

THE WINTER BLUES: Most people know that winter air is drier, indoors and out. Don't forget that people (children, especially) with ichthyosis tend to feel cold (and heat) more than people with normal skin. If you can't move to Hawaii or another warm, humid climate for the winter, at least remain aware of your child's needs. It's hard to calculate the right amount of clothing, because too much is almost as bad as too little. If the child is old enough to answer, just ask! And don't forget school classroom conditions, winter as well as summer.

GLYCOLIC ACID: Some members have been reporting considerable success with preparations using glycolic acid, the member of the alpha hydroxy group with the smallest molecule. It helps break apart the clumped skin cells so they can be washed off. Patients report that it's hard to find. Herald Pharmacal, Inc., of Richmond, V A has a line of glycolic acid products, including Aqua Glycolic Lotion, a 5% preparation. Tell your doctor and pharmacist.

PALM AND SOLES: An adult member with EH that causes her palms and soles to be thick and hard offers this suggestion to others with her problem: Apply a softening cream to hands or feet for several minutes, then shave the "extra" skin off with a regular shaving razor. Proceed with Caution!!

NATURAL OR SYNTHETIC?: Natural fibers, such as cotton or wool, may be nice, but they tend to wick moisture from the body, thereby actually aggravating ichthyosis. Consider less absorbent synthetics next to the skin.
